What should I already know?

- The changes and significant events in the life of my family and myself.
- That some events are so important that we still remember them today.
- London was, and still is, the capital city of England.

What will I find out by the end of the unit?

- Guy Fawkes lived in the 1600's this was around the time of Samuel Pepys.
- The Great Fire of London happened during the Reign of King Charles II.
- The Great Fire was caused by several factors (wind, summer weather, hygiene, width of streets and the close proximity of buildings).
- After the fire there were many changes made in the rebuilding of London to prevent another fire.
- The diaries of Samuel Pepys have played a major part in our understanding of the events of the Great Fire of London.
- To place the Great Fire of London onto a timeline of our existing historical knowledge.
- The Great Fire of London lasted just under 5 days and one-third of the city was destroyed. 100,000 people were made homeless.
- The monument in London is one way we commemorate the event to this day.
- The Great Fire helped to end the Plague in London by killing the rats and fleas which carried the disease.
- The Gunpowder Plot happened in 1605 around 60 years before the Great Fire of London.

- Order and place the main events of the Great Fire of London into chronological order on a timeline.
- Use a variety of sources to find out about the event (paintings, diary extracts, information books and the internet).
- Identify the cause of the Great Fire of London and how London changed as a result.
- Understand the significance of Samuel Pepys.
- To find out about the importance of the diary account of Samuel Pepys in our understanding of the Great Fire of London.
- Know about aspects of life in 1666 and compare to own life identifying similarities and differences.
- Demonstrate empathy with the past by writing a diary extract from the view of an eye witness of the fire.
